

Theological Course.

The pressing need of educated ministers in all parts of the State has led to the establishment of this course.

Young and middle aged men of all denominations who desire to prepare for the ministry and have not time for the full College course before commencing on theology, are invited to enter upon this course at once.

Tuition is free. Pupils pursuing this course may receive instruction in other courses at half usual rates.

Recitations are so arranged that those who wish can spend a part of each day in labor, or a part of each week in mission work in the surrounding country.

The studies in this course, at present, include the usual English branches of Theological Seminaries, and several of the more important of the College branches.

Instruction in most of these branches is given by lectures. Special attention is given to preparation for leading Prayer-Meetings and Sabbath Schools.

The full course, as now arranged, occupies four years. Three different denominations are represented in the classes already formed.

As the aim of this course is to fit the student for thorough and successful teaching, as well as to meet the immediate demand for teachers throughout the State, it will consist of such branches as are usually taught in Common Schools together with a few of the more advanced studies. lorger leading

Throughout the course there will be, at stated times, practice in Reading, Writing, and Spelling.

No examination for admission is required, but pupils will be classed according to their attainments.

Students completing this course will receive a certificate, stating their qualifications to teach the studies pursued by them.

OTHER COURSES.

Agricultural Course.

The establishment of this course has not as yet been undertaken; it will, however, become a prominent one in the Institution.

Some thirty acres of land belonging to the Institution, and lying adacent to the College grounds, will afford ample opportunity for practical instruction in those things which pertain to the science of Agriculture, and furnish a pleasant and healthful exercise.

All male students are required to work at least one hour a day.

Primary and Intermediate Courses.

There have, hitherto, been connected with the other courses Primary and intermediate Courses of Study for the accommodaCATALOGUE OF TALLADEGA COLLEGE.

tion of the Younger and less advanced pupils.

These courses will be continued so long as the necessity for their continuance may seem to exist.

The studies pursued are such as are usually found in the Primary and Intermediate Departments of Graded Schools, such as Reading, Writing, Elementary Arithmetic, and Geography.

GENERAL INFORMATION.

Membership.

For membership in the Institution, applicants must have a good moral character, and should come prepared to give satisfactory testimonials of such character.

Applicants from other schools will be expected to furnish certificates of honorable dismission therefrom.

None from abroad who are under fifteen years of age, will be received except by special arrangement. For all such, application in writing should be made previous to their coming.

Those desiring to become boarders should also send previous notice to that effect.

Pupils should be present, if possible, the first day of the school year or term, that they may be immediately classified and thus lose no time. Students in regular classes lose their membership when absent during any part of the year; while absence without leave may forfeit the pupil's right to membership in the Institution.

The following are some of the text-books at present in use in the Institution: Readers and Spellers (Parker and Watson); Geography (Guyot); Mathematics, including Arithmetic and Algebra, (Davies); English Grammar (Clark).

For text-books used in the College Preparatory and Higher Normal Department, see their respective Courses of Study.

Only such text-books as are used in the Institution will be of value to the pupil; all others will be useless.

Facilities for Self-Support.

A few students have been aided during the past year by their own labor; the Institution furnishing them a certain amount of work with fair remuneration therefor. It is probable that a few may be thus aided another year, but all students, so far as possible, should come prepared to pay their expenses. In no case should any one come, hoping to receive such aid, unless such person has applied for it, and received a favorable answer. Attention to this statement may save time, trouble, and disappointment.

Applicants for aid from the Institution should state their necessities, advancement in their studies, and when possible, the pursuit they intend to follow.

Most of the Theological students have earned a considerable of their support by doing mission work in the surrounding country.

Those desiring to be reaching also send previous

By far the best means of self-support is found in *teaching*.— The demand for teachers properly qualified for this work, is usually in excess of the supply; and hence nearly all of those who are sufficiently advanced in scholarship can aid themselves by teaching.

The summer vacation of this Institution, which includes the months of July, August, and September, affords an excellent opportunity for diligent and qualified students to engage in teaching, without encroaching upon their regular terms of study.

County Superintendents of Schools, and others desirous of securing teachers from this Institution, will favor their own interests, by so arranging the sessions of the public schools as to have them occur during its summer vacation.

Members of this Institution who may be considered by their instructors qualified for teaching, will be furnished with certificates stating their qualifications and standing; and as a means of protection from imposition, applicants for schools claiming to be from Talladega College, should be required to present such certificates.

To any persons desirous of securing competent teachers, the Instructors will be glad to recommend such, and all communications upon this subject will be promptly attended to.

Music.

Excellent advantages are offered for study and drill in both Instrumental and Vocal music.

Instruction in Vocal music will be given to any who may desire it, free.

For charges for instruction in Instrumental music, see "Expenses."

Accommodations.

At present, accommodations in the way of rooms and board can be furnished for about fifty ladies, and nearly the same number of gentlemen, by the Institution.

Other accommodations can be had at reasonable rates in the houses of private families.

Regulations.

As it is the aim of the Institution to promote good scholarship and Christian character, the following regulations have been adopted, as calculated to secure these results:

Students are not allowed to use intoxicating liquors.

The use of tobacco in any form upon the College premises, or in other public places, is prohibited.

All profanity, playing at cards, dice, or billiards, and every thing tending to immorality of life, is strictly forbidden.

Cleanliness of room and person is required.

Regular and punctual attendance upon all hours for study and recitation, and upon the established religious exercises of the Institution, is expected; as also entire and cheerful obedience to its regulations and to the officers of the same.

The government of the Institution is designed to be moral and conciliatory. It will be strict and impartial.

Students, so far as possible, are thrown upon their own good behavior—appeal being made to their own sense of justice and propriety, and their principles of honor—and are understood on entering, to pledge themselves to obey all the regulations of the Institution.

But should such consideration fail to secure obedience, the officers will not hesitate to punish with reprimand, suspension, or expulsion. Hence, those who have not a fixed purpose to improve their time, and an earnest desire to fit themselves for usefulness, should not seek admission, as the presence of such will not be tolerated.

Religious Exercises.

Students are required to attend the tollowing religious exercises: Church service and Sabbath School on the Sabbath; Daily Prayers at their boarding places, and, in the morning, at the chapel.

History and Design.

This Institution is the outgrowth of the educational work begun and carried on in the State of Alabama by the American Missionary Association.

Ever since the commencement of this educational work, it has been the design to establish, in addition to the other various schools in the State, one central Institution for higher education, beginning with Normal and Preparatory Departments, and by growth developing into a College.

Talladega, because of its healthful location, and peculiar advantages offered in the way of purchasing a suitable site and building, was selected as the best place in the State for such an Institution.

Here, in the year 1867, the Association, aided by the Government, purchased a fine College property, consisting of about forty acres of land together with a fine College building. The latter is an imposing brick structure, one hundred by sixty feet. It was erected before the war at a cost of \$23.000, and is called, in honor of one who aided largely in securing its purchase, "Swayne" Hall.

A charter, incorporating the Institution with full collegiate powers, was obtained in February, 1869, and a Board of Trustees formed.

In Swayne Hall are found the chapel, school and recitation rooms, and private rooms for the young men.

A second building was completed for occupation in the summer of 1870, at a cost of about \$20,000. It is a fine four-storied, brick building, well finished, and contains parlors, dining room, kitchen, and private study and sleeping rooms for some fifty lady pupils. This building bears the name of "Foster" Hall, as a testimonial to the generous liberality of Rev. L. Foster, Blue Island, Ill.

It is the present design of the Institution to increase its accommodations and educational facilities by an addition to Foster Hall and the erection of a third building to contain additional school rooms, lecture rooms, library, and private study and sleeping rooms for the young men.

Aims.

The advantages and privileges of the Institution are offered to all of either sex, without regard to sect, race, color, or nationality.

It aims to furnish athorough education, under the best methods of instruction, in a sufficiently wide range of studies, securing a substantial preparation for professional studies, teaching, or general business.

It aims also to secure the best development of social character, by bringing students of both sexes, from various localities, under the same general discipline; occupying separate buildings, yet constituting one family; associating in school and religious exercises and in the dining hall, under the constant oversight of the teachers.

Above all it claims to be an Institution of *Christian* learning. It stands upon the broadest possible basis and is in no respect sectarian.

It is designed to make the Institution, so far as possible, a home for those who attend. Parents and guardians may rest assured that any youth placed under the care of the Instructors,

will be their especial charge, and that the rules of good conduct and good morals will be at all times enforced.

Talladega College, like many others in their early history, has many wants:

1st. A New Hall for the accommodation of the young men.—
The rooms upon the third floor of Swayne hall, thus far occupied by the young men, are merely temporary ones, and are used for that purpose only because necessity has demanded it.
The prospect of a large increase in the number of young men attending the Institution, makes such a building a pressing want. In view of such want, the erection of a third building is contemplated, which shall contain, in addition to the necessary private rooms for the young men, additional school and recitation rooms, lecture rooms, library room, etc.

It is hoped that the work upon this much needed building may be soon commenced, and carried forward to an early completion. It must be built. Who will furnish the necessary means?

2d. The College needs *Endowments*. No educational Institution can rest on a solid basis, without a permanent fund from which a regular income may accrue.

Since the establishment of the Institution, the salaries of the teachers, as well as a large part of its current expenses, have been paid by the American Missionary Association. To this Association, the Institution owes its existence and support thus far, but it should now begin to furnish its own means of support. To whom shall the Institution look for endowments?

3d. There is pressing need of Apparatus, (Philosophical and Chemical), Reference Books, Maps, &c. The more advanced classes are already in need of these. How can the Institution do without them?

4th. Library. The want of this has already been severely felt. How often have students desired to consult books, on various subjects! In answer to their inquiries for them, it could only be said that the Institution did not possess them.—

This want is imperative. Who will aid in the supply of this want?

Standard works, either from publishing houses or private libraries, would be of great benefit and highly appreciated.

It is proposed to make the supply of this want a special ob-

ject, the coming year.

5th. The students are desirous of establishing a Reading Room in connection with their Literary Society. During the past year a small beginning has been made in this direction and only a beginning. Should any one feel disposed to contribute to this object, in the way of sending books, papers, or periodicals, he may rest assured such contribution will be rightly esteemed by the recipients.

6th. Scholarships for the support of needy but worthy students. A large field is here open, than which no better can be found for the offerings of Christian Philanthropy. Seed (in the form of financial aid) sown in this field, will produce immediate

and rich returns.

Location.

Talladega, the pleasant and thriving county seat of Talladega county, among the hills and mountains of Northern Alabama, is situated on the line of the Selma, Rome, and Dalton Railroad, by means of which it is accessible to the various parts of the State.

For beauty of location and healthfulness of climate, it cannot be surpassed by any other portion of Alabama.
